In the beginning, God created the heavens and the earth. . .

The Really Big Picture

But something went terribly wrong, what was it?

Man rejected God's authority and chose to go his own way

Adam was faced with a stark choice when the voice of the tempter challenged the voice of God.

His wrong choice brought devastating consequences on him – and upon the entire world.

To reject God's rightful authority is called sin. It shows itself in many ways – from active rebellion to passive indifference – but basically refuses to allow God His rightful place as our Creator God.

God sent His Son to right the wrongs we have done

We try desperately to fix ourselves and our world, but God has a different solution.

Jesus came to earth announcing a new kingdom, giving us the opportunity to escape the snare and consequences of sin and come back to God. His mission: to reconcile us to Himself and restore us from the curse of sin. His claim: "I am the way, and the truth, and the life; no one comes to the Father but through Me." John 14:6. His promise to those who would follow Him: "Truly, truly, I say to you, he who hears My word, and believes Him who sent Me, has eternal life, and does not come into judgment, but has passed out of death into life." John 5:24

What Jesus Did

"For Christ also died for sins once for all, the just for the unjust, so that He might bring us to God."

1 Peter 3:18

Why Jesus?

Who He is:

Jesus is the Messiah – the Lord God in human flesh who offers Himself as the Savior of the world.

What He did:

Jesus is the only person to ever live His entire life as God required – not a single sin in thought word or deed. And, yet, He gave Himself as a sacrifice for our sins when He died upon the cross. God declared His payment for the sins we've committed to be sufficient when He raised Him from the dead.

However, most people did not accept God's solution to their problem. They rejected and killed God's Son, Jesus. But some received Him and became His

followers. Today is no different.

Existence independent from God

The Bible calls this "the domain of darkness." Satan, who hates you, is the ultimate ruler of this domain. It is characterized by pride, emptiness, fractured relationships and bondage to sin. Ultimately, this path leads to eternal suffering in hell.

RECEIVE HIM

"If you confess with your mouth Jesus as Lord, and believe in your heart that God raised Him from the dead, you will be saved." Romans 10:9
